

PAVILION FUNDRAISER

The Woolverstone Hall Cricket Pavilion is widely regarded as a rather unique and attractive structure and was built by the estate workers for John Berners, under the direction of Mr Charles Tebbit in 1894.

Since then, the pavilion has welcomed hundreds of visiting sports teams and held many post-match teas, first for the Berners' annual 'Cricket Week' and subsequently for Woolverstone Hall School and of course, Ipswich High School.

The first cricket match was played in 1894, Woolverstone Park vs. Colchester Garrison and thus began a Berners' tradition that lasted well into the 1920s. With his extensive sporting and military connections, John Berners was able to host an array of famous cricketers from national and county teams, his own Old Etonian 'Ramblers', as well as various divisions of the British Army. In fact, the Royal Horse Artillery played at Woolverstone just 10 days before WW1 broke out.

The pavilion has remained relatively unchanged since its description from the EADT in June 1895, published as part of their extensive coverage of the week's cricket:

"On the far side, opposite the hall, there stands a permanent pavilion of picturesque design, which perhaps might be said, without overdoing the matter, to harmonise with the sylvan scene. The external walls are of bark and rustic oak, the gable-ends are 'rough cast', and the overhanging roof is covered with thatch. The interior is match-boarded, and a large and lofty dining or luncheon room, which forms the principal apartment, opens out upon a verandah at the front, which commands a splendid view of the field."

Lord Chief Justice, Lord Russell of Killowen was a visitor to the cricket week in 1895, as he was staying at Woolverstone Hall as the guest of Mr Berners (a short while later, the Prime Minister, Lord Salisbury was also a guest at Woolverstone Hall). No doubt the pavilion has been privy to many an interesting conversation, something which led to speculation in the national newspapers when one dignitary was forced to deny that discussions of a parliamentary nature had taken place improperly at the Woolverstone Cricket Week.

Now approaching 130 years since its opening, the pavilion is in need of some attention. Most recently, the school has begun a process of restoration to be tackled in stages. Last year, stage one was completed with the re-thatching of the roof and the school is now moving onto the second, and final stage, focusing on the internal restoration and the creation of a permanent café to be used for sporting fixtures and as a hub for school and community events. The school has been extremely fortunate to receive numerous donations from Woolverstone Hall Old Boys, parents of current students and organisations such as the Adam Peaty Race Clinics, which have enabled the work thus far to be carried out. To mark their gratitude for donations received, the school will be installing a permanent plaque listing the names of all donors giving over £200 to the fund.

We very much want our restored pavilion to be a fundamental part of our school for many more generations to come.





The Berners Family of Woolverstone

William Berners bought Woolverstone Hall and 350 acres in August 1773 for £11,440.

When Geoffrey Berners sold the Woolverstone Hall estate in 1937, it covered 10 square miles of beautiful, unspoilt countryside. In all 6,042 acres, in seven parishes, on the Shotley Peninsula in Suffolk.

The Berners' story starts in the age of Elizabeth I and stretches to just before World War 2. Their story is one of judicious investment, fortuitous inheritance and profitable marriage. With their wealth they built farms, houses, village halls, extended churches, altered roads and shaped the Shotley Peninsula.





HANNAH SCOTT INTERVIEW

Firstly, a little write up about yourself.

My name is Hannah Scott. I'm an independent singer, songwriter and piano teacher. I grew up in Bramford, just outside Ipswich and now live in South London with my partner and two young stepsons. After leaving IHS, I studied French & Italian at Durham University, spending a wonderful year living in rural Tuscany as part of my degree, but after graduating, I decided to follow my passion - writing songs and performing them live. As an artist, highlights include my song "No Gravity" featuring in an episode of hit US TV series Greys Anatomy which was broadcast worldwide. recording a live session with Dermot O'Leary on BBC Radio 2 and performing at Edinburgh's Festival Theatre to an audience of 2000.



What year did you join & leave?

I joined in 1994 and left in 2001 (VERY reluctantly!!)

What were your favourite classes?

When I first started, I loved music lessons and was lucky to be taught by Mr Highcock and Mrs Wilson for my first year or two. I also really enjoyed my early biology lessons - I actually wanted to be a doctor until I realised I was better at languages and my maths and other sciences were not good enough. As I progressed further up the school, I came to love English with Mrs Steer, German with Frau Thomson and French with Mrs Curran (who terrified and inspired me in equal measure!)

Who was your favourite teacher & why?

Mrs Steer - and I would say most of my year would give that answer too! She was such an inspiring teacher, supportive and caring, and genuinely interested in our thoughts and opinions. If I could inspire just one of my piano students in the way she inspired whole classes of teenagers, I'd be pretty pleased.

Most memorable moment?

Oh there were so many but probably playing the voice of Audrey II, the maneating plant in the school production of A Little Shop Of Horrors when I was in Sixth Form and emerging from the mouth of the plant during the curtain call!

I was also pretty pleased to score IHS's first goal for the school's first ever football team - which I had badgered Miss Waghorn to start for months and months! It was a nice surprise when my goal was announced in assembly too.

What did you think of the campus and the extracurricular activities?

Woolverstone Hall is a place I've always wanted to show to important people in my life. I remember having a conversation with one of my peers, Kate Riley, about how the school is one of our "places" and always will be. Coming up the drive still somehow feels like returning home. We didn't realise it at the time of course, but we really were so very lucky to be educated in such beautiful surroundings. Some of my fondest memories are around the Enrichment activities I took part in - school plays, singing in the choir and playing in the orchestra at Snape, Christmas concerts, and of course the football team.





What advice would you give a current pupil?

I would say get involved in as many activities as you can - you are so lucky to be at a school where the Enrichment opportunities are so wide-ranging.

I would also say follow your passion rather than the career path you think you should follow or other people think you should follow. I'm lucky that my parents have always supported my music and because I love what I do, it rarely feels like work.

Did Woolverstone Hall give you the support you needed to follow your career? If so, how? If not, how could it have been improved?

I was writing "pop" songs on acoustic guitar in the late 90s and early noughties and the school and music department were much more traditional / classical-based at the time. I remember asking if I could perform one of my songs at Snape Maltings during one of the annual concerts, and being told "that type of music wouldn't go down well". I do look back on this with a little sadness, given that the school was so very encouraging and nurturing in all other aspects but I am sure that 20-25 years later it is embracing all types of music and creative output.



Sentence to sum up your time at school?

Amazing teaching, brilliant opportunities, and friendships that would end up being lifelong: I don't think another school could have given me close to what IHS gave.

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




Limited Edition Michael Coulter Woolverstone Print

IHS NEWS

Ipswich High School has been extremely lucky to participate in the eighth Norwich Model Arctic Council, informally known as NORMAC.

This experience saw eleven students travel to Norwich for an extended weekend of discussions representing diplomats from all over the Arctic Circle. The Arctic Council was made up of eight member states, but also six permanent participants which consisted of indigenous tribes. IHS had the pleasure of representing the Arctic Athabaskan Council, the Saami Council, the Russian Federation, and Sweden. The issues to be discussed included Food Insecurity, and Marine Protected Areas, both complex issues facing the Arctic in our current world.

An outline of our experience at NORMAC would include a welcoming dinner, with speeches from the respective Ambassadors. Then, the rest of the weekend consisted of negotiation, collaborations and a focus on democratically coming to solutions that would benefit all member states and permanent participants, not to mention a formal dinner to conclude events. Three days of discussion resulted in two declarations passed unanimously on both issues discussed. These declarations could not have succeeded without well-researched information and a positive attitude to the conference.







The NORMAC experience provided an opportunity to take on many valuable skills, including debating, collaboration and providing some insight into a diplomat's perspective. The conference was guided by Dr Anthony Speca, whose Arctic experience speaks for itself. He offered crucial advice and led debriefings after the preceding day. This particularly guided us in growing from our mistakes and was a beneficial chance to reflect and learn. Overall, the experience was very valuable and insightful for us all, and we thank Norwich School for hosting!
